

1 Samuel 19

King James Version (KJV)

19 And Saul spake to Jonathan his son, and to all his servants, that they should kill David. (Saul plotting murder; typical corrupt leader; it didn't take long; Saul was the first man king of Israel)

² But Jonathan Saul's son delighted much in David: and Jonathan told David, saying, Saul my father seeketh to kill thee: now therefore, I pray thee, take heed to thyself until the morning, and abide in a secret place, and hide thyself: (God chose David's progeny to come into the world as Jesus. HE won't let David get killed. Satan is still trying to destroy the seed line of Jesus. Jesus will come through Nathan, David's son)

³ And I will go out and stand beside my father in the field where thou art, and I will commune with my father of thee; and what I see, that I will tell thee. (Jonathan is a good man, not a murderer, like Saul. He will pass on information to keep David safe)

⁴ And Jonathan spake good of David unto Saul his father, and said unto him, Let not the king sin against his servant, against David; because he hath not sinned against thee, and because his works have been to thee-ward very good: (That won't matter to Saul. He's totally corrupt and wants to hold on to power at any cost – including committing Murder)

⁵ For he did put his life in his hand, and slew the Philistine, and the LORD wrought a great salvation for all Israel: thou sawest it, and didst rejoice: wherefore then wilt thou sin against innocent blood, to slay David without a cause? (David put his life on the line, when no one else would, to face Goliath. God saved Israel, through David)

⁶ And Saul hearkened unto the voice of Jonathan: and Saul sware, As the LORD liveth, he shall not be slain. (Saul is lying. He'll continue to try to kill David)

⁷ And Jonathan called David, and Jonathan shewed him all those things. And Jonathan brought David to Saul, and he was in his presence, as in times past. (This "peace" won't last long)

⁸ And there was war again: and David went out, and fought with the Philistines, and slew them with a great slaughter; and they fled from

him. (David has the Spirit of God upon him. He is courageous and successful)

⁹ And the evil spirit from the LORD was upon Saul, as he sat in his house with his javelin in his hand: and David played with his hand. (David was trying to pacify Saul)

¹⁰ And Saul sought to smite David even to the wall with the javelin: but he slipped away out of Saul's presence, and he smote the javelin into the wall: and David fled, and escaped that night. (So much for Saul's oath to God. This is Saul's 3rd attempt on David's life. Saul's servants will try to kill David 6 more times)

¹¹ Saul also sent messengers unto David's house, to watch him, and to slay him in the morning: and Michal David's wife told him, saying, If thou save not thy life to night, to morrow thou shalt be slain.

¹² So Michal let David down through a window: and he went, and fled, and escaped.

¹³ And Michal took an image, and laid it in the bed, and put a pillow of goats' hair for his bolster, and covered it with a cloth. (an image= a teraphim <in the Hebrew> – an statue, probably of a pagan god. This demonstrates how far away from God that Saul and Israel were drifting – right into idolatry, again)

¹⁴ And when Saul sent messengers to take David, she said, He is sick. (Michal is risking her life to protect David from the king)

¹⁵ And Saul sent the messengers again to see David, saying, Bring him up to me in the bed, that I may slay him.

¹⁶ And when the messengers were come in, behold, there was an image in the bed, with a pillow of goats' hair for his bolster. (Many of these servants were looking to eliminate David, and to get themselves promoted in Saul's court)

¹⁷ And Saul said unto Michal, Why hast thou deceived me so, and sent away mine enemy, that he is escaped? And Michal answered Saul, He said unto me, Let me go; why should I kill thee? (She pretended that David had threatened her)

¹⁸ So David fled, and escaped, and came to Samuel to Ramah, and told him all that Saul had done to him. And he and Samuel went and dwelt

in Naioth. (A training school for prophets and priests. Many years later, Elijah and Elisha also went there)

¹⁹ And it was told Saul, saying, Behold, David is at Naioth in Ramah.

²⁰ And Saul sent messengers to take David: and when they saw the company of the prophets prophesying, and Samuel standing as appointed over them, the Spirit of God was upon the messengers of Saul, and they also prophesied. (God stopped them in their tracks)

²¹ And when it was told Saul, he sent other messengers, and they prophesied likewise. And Saul sent messengers again the third time, and they prophesied also. (Saul cannot prevail against God)

²² Then went he also to Ramah, and came to a great well that is in Sechu: and he asked and said, Where are Samuel and David? And one said, Behold, they be at Naioth in Ramah.

²³ And he went thither to Naioth in Ramah: and the Spirit of God was upon him also, and he went on, and prophesied, until he came to Naioth in Ramah.

²⁴ And he stripped off his clothes also, and prophesied before Samuel in like manner, and lay down naked all that day and all that night. Wherefore they say, Is Saul also among the prophets? (naked – without his outer garment and his armor and weapons; God is in control, whether Saul likes it or not)
