

Jeremiah 52

King James Version (KJV)

A summary – a second witness to the Book of 2Kings-24 & 25 with added prophecy of the end times

52 Zedekiah was one and twenty years old when he began to reign, and he reigned eleven years in Jerusalem. And his mother's name was Hamutal the daughter of Jeremiah of Libnah. (Hamutal - the dew of the evening) (A different Jeremiah) (Zedekiah = the justice of Yah)

²And he did that which was evil in the eyes of the LORD, according to all that Jehoiakim had done. (Idolatry, paganism, treachery, deceit; he agreed to rule under Nebuchadnezzar, then broke his word and sided with Egypt against him; he was a liar who couldn't be trusted)

³For through the anger of the LORD it came to pass in Jerusalem and Judah, till he had cast them out from his presence, that Zedekiah rebelled against the king of Babylon. (God told him not to, but he refused to listen) (God had judged Israel and Judah to be destroyed and the people into captivity for 70 years. Those who listened to God survived)

⁴And it came to pass in the ninth year of his reign, in the tenth month, in the tenth day of the month, that Nebuchadnezzar king of Babylon came, he and all his army, against Jerusalem, and pitched against it, and built forts against it round about. (a siege)

⁵So the city was besieged unto the eleventh year of king Zedekiah. (Zedekiah is a great example of what a bad leader can do to a country)

⁶And in the fourth month, in the ninth day of the month, the famine was sore in the city, so that there was no bread for the people of the land. (They refused to obey God and lived in misery in Jerusalem. Those that obeyed and went into captivity into Babylon thrived and lived good lives)

⁷Then the city was broken up, and all the men of war fled, and went forth out of the city by night by the way of the gate between the two walls, which was by the king's garden; (now the Chaldeans were by the city round about:) and they went by the way of the plain. (The very men who caused the problem were the first ones to run, and left the people defenseless)

⁸ But the army of the Chaldeans pursued after the king, and overtook Zedekiah in the plains of Jericho; and all his army was scattered from him. (Jericho was where Joshua and the Israelites first entered the Promised Land)

⁹ Then they took the king, and carried him up unto the king of Babylon to Riblah in the land of Hamath; where he gave judgment upon him. (Hamath was a Kenite stronghold)

¹⁰ And the king of Babylon slew the sons of Zedekiah before his eyes: he slew also all the princes of Judah in Riblah. (He executed all the males from the king's line. The females went with Jeremiah to Egypt, and then, later to Britain)

¹¹ Then he put out the eyes of Zedekiah; and the king of Babylon bound him in chains, and carried him to Babylon, and put him in prison till the day of his death. (Prophetically, the later king of Babylon <antichrist> will blind most of the world through his lies, deception and false doctrine)

¹² Now in the fifth month, in the tenth day of the month, which was the nineteenth year of Nebuchadrezzar king of Babylon, came Nebuzaradan, captain of the guard, which served the king of Babylon, into Jerusalem,

¹³ And burned the house of the LORD, and the king's house; and all the houses of Jerusalem, and all the houses of the great men, burned he with fire: (All caused by Zedekiah. He caused the destruction of his own country, and the temple of God)

¹⁴ And all the army of the Chaldeans, that were with the captain of the guard, brake down all the walls of Jerusalem round about.

¹⁵ Then Nebuzaradan the captain of the guard carried away captive certain of the poor of the people, and the residue of the people that remained in the city, and those that fell away, that fell to the king of Babylon, and the rest of the multitude. (They didn't kill them; they only killed the crooked leaders that broke their word)

¹⁶ But Nebuzaradan the captain of the guard left certain of the poor of the land for vinedressers and for husbandmen.

¹⁷ Also the pillars of brass that were in the house of the LORD, and the bases, and the brasen sea that was in the house of the LORD, the

Chaldeans brake, and carried all the brass of them to Babylon. (These things had been there since the days of Solomon; they stripped the temple bare, and then destroyed the building itself)

¹⁸ The caldrons also, and the shovels, and the snuffers, and the bowls, and the spoons, and all the vessels of brass wherewith they ministered, took they away.

¹⁹ And the basons, and the firepans, and the bowls, and the caldrons, and the candlesticks, and the spoons, and the cups; that which was of gold in gold, and that which was of silver in silver, took the captain of the guard away. (All separated everything by metal and value; packed and taken to Babylon)

²⁰ The two pillars, one sea, and twelve brasen bulls that were under the bases, which king Solomon had made in the house of the LORD: the brass of all these vessels was without weight. (So much brass that it couldn't be weighed)

²¹ And concerning the pillars, the height of one pillar was eighteen cubits; and a fillet of twelve cubits did compass it; and the thickness thereof was four fingers: it was hollow. (Pillars hold up the building; these were symbolic for holding up the Word of God – spiritually)

²² And a chapter of brass was upon it; and the height of one chapter was five cubits, with network and pomegranates upon the chapters round about, all of brass. The second pillar also and the pomegranates were like unto these.

²³ And there were ninety and six pomegranates on a side; and all the pomegranates upon the network were an hundred round about. Revelation-3:12 (He that overcomes <antichrist's deception> will I make a pillar thereof in my house; the Elect will be spiritual pillars that hold up the Word of God when antichrist deceives the whole world)

²⁴ And the captain of the guard took Seraiah the chief priest, and Zephaniah the second priest, and the three keepers of the door:

²⁵ He took also out of the city an eunuch, which had the charge of the men of war; and seven men of them that were near the king's person, which were found in the city; and the principal scribe of the host, who mustered the people of the land; and threescore men of the people of the land, that were found in the midst of the city. (They were found; probably hiding)

²⁶ So Nebuzaradan the captain of the guard took them, and brought them to the king of Babylon to Riblah.

²⁷ And the king of Babylon smote them, and put them to death in Riblah in the land of Hamath. Thus Judah was carried away captive out of his own land. (Hamath was a Kenite city. The Kenites always seem to be around when trouble befalls Israel) see Amos-6

²⁸ This is the people whom Nebuchadrezzar carried away captive: in the seventh year three thousand Jews and three and twenty:

²⁹ In the eighteenth year of Nebuchadrezzar he carried away captive from Jerusalem eight hundred thirty and two persons:

³⁰ In the three and twentieth year of Nebuchadrezzar Nebuzaradan the captain of the guard carried away captive of the Jews seven hundred forty and five persons: all the persons were four thousand and six hundred.

(This was the end of the 3rd and final siege of Jerusalem. These are they that rebelled against God and had refused to go into captivity, as God had commanded them through Jeremiah. Those who had gone willingly were alive and well in Babylon. Those who refused were killed by the Chaldeans)

³¹ And it came to pass in the seven and thirtieth year of the captivity of Jehoiachin king of Judah, in the twelfth month, in the five and twentieth day of the month, that Evilmerodach king of Babylon in the first year of his reign lifted up the head of Jehoiachin king of Judah, and brought him forth out of prison. (Evilmerodach – means fool unto death. He was Nebuchadnezzar's heir. Jehoiachin was one of the worst kings of Judah. He had been in prison in Babylon for 37 years. Nebuchadnezzar was dead at this time. God called Jehoiachin, Jeconiah and finally, Coniah, because He hated him so much)

³² And spake kindly unto him, and set his throne above the throne of the kings that were with him in Babylon, (One of the people that Nebuchadnezzar had elevated was Daniel. This fool put Coniah over Daniel. This is also prophecy for how antichrist will elevate the evil and corrupt people who follow him, and put them in charge in his one-world system)

³³ And changed his prison garments: and he did continually eat bread before him all the days of his life. (The bread of the king of Babylon – you don't want this bread)

³⁴ And for his diet, there was a continual diet given him of the king of Babylon, every day a portion until the day of his death, all the days of his life. (Coniah traded in an everlasting life with God for a comfortable short life here on earth; a bad trade all around. He was a type for the rich, powerful, corrupt people of today)
