## 1 Samuel 17

King James Version (KJV) Chapters 17,18,19 are not in chronological order

- **17** Now the Philistines gathered together their armies to battle, and were gathered together at Shochoh, which belongeth to Judah, and pitched between Shochoh and Azekah, in Ephesdammim. (Chronologically, this happened after chapter 16:13, before Saul met David)
- <sup>2</sup>And Saul and the men of Israel were gathered together, and pitched by the valley of Elah, and set the battle in array against the Philistines. (About 60 miles SW of Jerusalem)
- <sup>3</sup> And the Philistines stood on a mountain on the one side, and Israel stood on a mountain on the other side: and there was a valley between them.
- <sup>4</sup> And there went out a champion out of the camp of the Philistines, named Goliath, of Gath, whose height was six cubits and a span.

(He was a descendant of the fallen angels, when they mated with the daughters of Adam; a hybrid giant) See Genesis-6 (After Noah's flood, there was another influx of the nephalim into the daughters of Adam. This was Satan's plan to destroy the seedline that would lead to Jesus. See Genesis-14 for the second influx. Also see 2 Samuel-21:19-20 for additional data on these giants < geeber>)

- <sup>5</sup> And he had an helmet of brass upon his head, and he was armed with a coat of mail; and the weight of the coat was five thousand shekels of brass. (Goliath is a type for antichrist in the end days)
- <sup>6</sup> And he had <u>greaves of brass upon his legs</u>, and a target of brass between his shoulders. (greaves of brass upon his legs = armor on his shins)
- <sup>7</sup>And the staff of his spear was like a weaver's beam; and his spear's head weighed six hundred shekels of iron: and one bearing a shield went before him. (6 weapons, 6 cubit tall, a spear that weighs 600 shekels; this guy has 6's all over him)
- And he stood and cried unto the armies of Israel, and said unto them, Why are ye come out to set your battle in array? am not I a Philistine, and ye servants to Saul? choose you a man for you, and let him come down to me.

- <sup>9</sup> If he be able to fight with me, and to kill me, then will we be your servants: but if I prevail against him, and kill him, then shall ye be our servants, and serve us. (With a battle hardened giant on their side, the Philistines figured they had the deck pretty well stacked in their favor. Normally, this would be a fool's bet for Israel, but God will intervene with David)
- <sup>10</sup> And the Philistine said, I defy the armies of Israel this day; give me a man, that we may fight together. (Goliath is taunting Israel, and there fore also their God)
- "When Saul and all Israel heard those words of the Philistine, they were <u>dismayed</u>, and greatly afraid. (dismayed = to break down in great fear)
- <sup>12</sup> Now David was the son of that Ephrathite of Bethlehemjudah, whose name was Jesse; and he had eight sons: and the man went among men for an old man in the days of Saul. (Seven sons in the previous chapter and in 1Chronicles; possibly one son had died before Samuel visited Jesse)
- <sup>13</sup> And the three eldest sons of Jesse went and followed Saul to the battle: and the names of his three sons that went to the battle were Eliab the firstborn, and next unto him Abinadab, and the third Shammah.
- <sup>14</sup> And David was the youngest: and the three eldest followed Saul.
- <sup>15</sup> But David <u>went and returned</u> from Saul to feed his father's sheep at Bethlehem. (He went back and forth)
- <sup>16</sup> And the Philistine drew near morning and evening, and presented himself forty days. (Continuously taunting Israel, and laughing at their God) (In Mathew-4, 40 days was how long Satan taunted Jesus in the desert)
- <sup>17</sup> And Jesse said unto David his son, Take now for thy brethren an ephah of this parched corn, and these ten loaves, and run to the camp of thy brethren; (The word corn was added by the translators. Parched means roasted ears of grain)
- <sup>18</sup> And carry these ten cheeses unto the captain of their thousand, and look how thy brethren fare, and take their pledge. (Food for Israel's

## army; take their pledge – something to prove that Jesse's sons are alive and well)

- <sup>19</sup> Now Saul, and they, and all the men of Israel, were in the valley of Elah, fighting with the Philistines.
- <sup>20</sup> And David rose up early in the morning, and left the sheep with a keeper, and took, and went, as Jesse had commanded him; and he came to the trench, as the host was going forth to the fight, and shouted for the battle. (All talk, from both sides, taunting each other)
- <sup>21</sup> For Israel and the Philistines had put the battle in array, army against army. (They were facing each other at a distance)
- <sup>22</sup> And David left his carriage in the hand of the keeper of the carriage, and ran into the army, and came and saluted his brethren.
- <sup>23</sup> And as he talked with them, behold, there came up the champion, the Philistine of Gath, Goliath by name, out of the armies of the Philistines, and spake according to the same words: and David heard them. (Gath was one of the 5 major regions and capital cities of the Philistine nation)
- <sup>24</sup> And all the men of Israel, when they saw the man, fled from him, and were sore afraid. (Goliath was one of the hybrid giant descendants of the fallen angels when they mated with the daughters of Adam See Genesis-6)
- <sup>25</sup> And the men of Israel said, Have ye seen this man that is come up? surely to defy Israel is he come up: and it shall be, that the man who killeth him, the king will enrich him with great riches, and will give him his daughter, and <u>make his father's house free in Israel</u>. (Tax free from the king for life)
- <sup>26</sup> And David spake to the men that stood by him, saying, What shall be done to the man that killeth this Philistine, and taketh away the reproach from Israel? for who is this uncircumcised Philistine, that he should defy the armies of the living God? (David had the Spirit of God within him since he was sanctified by Samuel)
- <sup>27</sup> And the people answered him after this manner, saying, So shall it be done to the man that killeth him. (You heard right, David)

- <sup>28</sup> And Eliab his eldest brother heard when he spake unto the men; and Eliab's anger was kindled against David, and he said, Why camest thou down hither? and with whom hast thou left those few sheep in the wilderness? I know thy pride, and the naughtiness of thine heart; for thou art come down that thou mightest see the battle. (This is jealousy, because Samuel chose David and not another of his brothers)
- <sup>29</sup> And David said, What have I now done? Is there not a cause? (Why hasn't anyone answered this heathen's challenge?)
- <sup>30</sup> And he turned from him toward another, and spake after the same manner: and the people answered him again after the former manner. (They repeated Eliab's answer)
- <sup>31</sup> And when the words were heard which David spake, they rehearsed them before Saul: and he sent for him. (No one else would step up. When Saul heard that he had a volunteer, he sent for him)
- <sup>32</sup> And David said to Saul, Let no man's heart fail because of him; thy servant will go and fight with this Philistine. (The other men weren't cowards. David had the Holy Spirit of God within him which made him extraordinarily brave. Goliath was almost twice the size and strength of a normal man)
- <sup>33</sup> And Saul said to David, Thou art not able to go against this Philistine to fight with him: for thou art but a youth, and he a man of war from his youth. (David looked totally outmatched by Goliath)
- <sup>34</sup> And David said unto Saul, Thy servant kept his father's sheep, and there came a lion, and a bear, and took a lamb out of the flock:
- <sup>35</sup> And I went out after him, and smote him, and delivered it out of his mouth: and when he arose against me, I caught him by his beard, and smote him, and slew him. (The shepherd protects and feeds the sheep. David is trying to convince Saul to let him go fight Goliath)
- <sup>36</sup>Thy servant slew both the lion and the bear: and this uncircumcised Philistine shall be as one of them, seeing he hath defied the armies of the living God. (David was a type for Jesus, the Chief Shepherd) (Also see Revelation-13 where the leopard and the bear are the enemies of the Elect; leopard = the Kenites; bear = the Russians)

- <sup>37</sup> David said moreover, The LORD that delivered me out of the paw of the lion, and out of the paw of the bear, he will deliver me out of the hand of this Philistine. And Saul said unto David, Go, and the LORD be with thee. (The Spirit of God had left Saul and settled within David)
- <sup>38</sup> And Saul armed David with his armour, and he put an helmet of brass upon his head; also he armed him with a coat of mail. (The king had the best weapons)
- <sup>39</sup> And David girded his sword upon his armour, and he assayed to go; for he had not proved it. And David said unto Saul, I cannot go with these; for <u>I have not proved them</u>. And David put them off him. (proved he was not practiced with those weapons)
- <sup>40</sup> And he took his staff in his hand, and chose him five smooth stones out of the brook, and put them in a shepherd's bag which he had, even in a scrip; and his sling was in his hand: and he drew near to the Philistine. (David rightfully decided to use the weapons that he was accustomed to and skillful at)
- <sup>41</sup> And the Philistine came on and drew near unto David; and the man that bare the shield went before him. (His armor bearer)
- <sup>42</sup> And when the Philistine looked about, and saw David, he disdained him: for he was but a youth, and <u>ruddy</u>, and of a fair countenance. (ruddy= shows blood in the face- a descendant of Adam: Genesis-2)
- <sup>43</sup> And the Philistine said unto David, Am I a dog, that thou comest to me with staves? And the Philistine cursed David by <u>his gods</u>. (Dagon and Baal) (Goliath was insulted for having to fight a young boy, armed with only a staff and a sling)
- <sup>44</sup> And the Philistine said to David, Come to me, and I will give thy flesh unto the fowls of the air, and to the beasts of the field. (Goliath didn't realize that he was really fighting against God)
- <sup>45</sup> Then said David to the Philistine, Thou comest to me with a sword, and with a spear, and with a shield: but I come to thee in the name of the LORD of hosts, the God of the armies of Israel, whom thou hast defied. Mathew-21:16, Psalms-8 (Out of the mouth of babes)
- 46 This day will the LORD deliver thee into mine hand; and I will smite thee, and take thine head from thee; and I will give the carcases of the host of the Philistines this day unto the fowls of the air, and to the

- wild beasts of the earth; that all the earth may know that there is a God in Israel. (This is a lesson to the troops of Israel and also meant to be a lesson to the Philistines. There is a living God in heaven)
- <sup>47</sup> And all this assembly shall know that the LORD saveth not with sword and spear: for the battle is the LORD's, and he will give you into our hands. (David states that it will be God that gives him the victory)
- <sup>48</sup> And it came to pass, when the Philistine arose, and came, and drew nigh to meet David, that David hastened, and ran toward the army to meet the Philistine. (David fought him on his terms, not on Goliath's terms)
- <sup>49</sup> And David put his hand in his bag, and took thence a stone, and slang it, and smote the Philistine in his forehead, that the stone sunk into his forehead; and he fell upon his face to the earth. (God killed Goliath with one shot)
- 50 So David prevailed over the Philistine with a sling and with a stone, and smote the Philistine, and slew him; but there was no sword in the hand of David.
- Therefore David ran, and stood upon the Philistine, and took his sword, and drew it out of the sheath thereof, and slew him, and cut off his head therewith. And when the Philistines saw their champion was dead, they fled. (They got the message. God was against them)
- <sup>52</sup> And the men of Israel and of Judah arose, and shouted, and pursued the Philistines, until thou come to the valley, and to the gates of Ekron. And the wounded of the Philistines fell down by the way to Shaaraim, even unto Gath, and unto Ekron. (They chased and slew them all the way back to their homes)
- <sup>53</sup> And the children of Israel returned from chasing after the Philistines, and they spoiled their tents.
- <sup>54</sup> And David took the head of the Philistine, and brought it to Jerusalem; but he put his armour in his tent. (At this time Jerusalem was called Jebus and was the Jebusites'. Israel had only taken some land west of Mt Moriah. Later, David would take all of Jebus and rename it, Jerusalem)

- <sup>55</sup> And when Saul saw David go forth against the Philistine, he said unto Abner, the captain of the host, Abner, whose son is this youth? And Abner said, As thy soul liveth, O king, I cannot tell.
- <sup>56</sup> And the king said, Enquire thou whose son the stripling is.
- <sup>57</sup> And as David returned from the slaughter of the Philistine, Abner took him, and brought him before Saul with the head of the Philistine in his hand.
- 58 And Saul said to him, Whose son art thou, thou young man? And David answered, I am the son of thy servant Jesse the Bethlehemite. (A thousand years later, Jesus would come into the world through Mary in Bethlehem)
